If God is peace, then to know God is to bask in His peace. The closer we draw to Him, the more of His peace we can enjoy (James 4:8). God gives us clear instructions about how to draw near to Him. Psalm 24:3–4 says, "Who may ascend the mountain of the LORD? Who may stand in his holy place? The one who has clean hands and a pure heart, who does not trust in an idol or swear by a false god." But Scripture is also clear that we cannot make ourselves clean enough or pure enough to earn the presence of the Lord (Romans 3:10, 23). So how do we draw near enough to experience His peace? Jesus said, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid" (John 14:27, ESV). We come into the presence of the Lord through His Son (John 14:6). When we allow Jesus' death and resurrection to purchase our forgiveness from God, we are counted as righteous (2 Corinthians 5:21). Our sins are forgiven because Jesus already paid the price for them. Only then can we have peace with God (Romans 4:5; 5:1; 1 John 4:10).

Do you have the peace of God that comes from having peace with God? If not, today can be the day of salvation. If you have peace with God, how are you experiencing the peace of God?



If experiencing peace is something you struggle with, pour your heart out to God. Ask Him to reveal what is keeping you from having peace. As you reflect on this passage again, write down at least one character trait or promise of the Messiah that you can have peace about today.



Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, for he has visited and redeemed his people and has raised up a horn of salvation for us in the house of his servant David, as he spoke by the mouth of his holy prophets from of old,

that we should be saved from our enemies and from the hand of all who hate us; to show the mercy promised to our fathers and to remember his holy covenant, the oath that he swore to our father Abraham, to grant us

In the years leading up to Christ's birth, many Israelites believed the arrival of
the Messiah would immediately bring a time of great peace and prosperity to
Israel. Even Jesus' disciples may have believed this. Jesus has shown through
His teaching and miracles that He is, in fact, the Messiah. Now, though, He
wants to help His followers understand that the season of political peace will
not come soon.

Instead, His arrival will bring great division to the world. He has come to bring a sword. Jesus is not describing the sword of God's judgment, nor one of military action, or of personal violence. The item Jesus refers to here is the Greek term machairan, most often used for large knives such as those used by fishermen. The main purpose of those blades was to separate different parts of a cut of meat—this is the same term used in the book of Hebrews to depict Scripture's ability to separate truth and error (Hebrews 4:12).

In other words, Jesus' message will naturally create division; this "sword" will divide the world into those who believe in Him and those who do not. His arrival will bring great conflict as those who reject Jesus as the Messiah and Son of God will turn in hatred against those who hear and believe (1 Peter 4:3–4; John 15:18–21), including the members of one's own family.

Although Jesus brought us peace with God, in what ways did He not bring peace?



Think about the ways in which following God have disrupted peace. What do these moments reveal about Jesus' warning in this passage?



What has receiving peace with God and the peace of God cost you? How have you held on to the Lord through these difficulties? Ask God to let the peace you have as a believer with God fuel the peace of God that you experience in the midst of your difficulties.



Therefore, remember that formerly you who are Gentiles by birth and called "uncircumcised" by those who call themselves "the circumcision" (which is done in the body by human hands)— remember that at that time you were separate from Christ, excluded from citizenship in Israel and foreigners to the covenants of the promise, without hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing

wall of hostility, by setting aside in his flesh the law with its commands and regulations. His purpose was to create in himself one new humanity out of the two, thus making peace, and in one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility. He came and preached peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near. For through him we both have access to the Father by one Spirit.

**Ephesians 2:11-18** 



Read the above passage. What does it reveal about peace?



How is God our peace, and what changes does this bring to our lives?



How is God calling you to live in light of this peace we have with Him and with the truth that He is our peace?



Spend some time rejoicing in and worshiping God for who He is and what He has done: for His coming to earth and for what He has done in your personal life to bring peace.



Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Iesus.

Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things. Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me—put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you.
